As I stood in line with all those in attendance, waiting

to offer my condolences to his grieving mother and fiancée, I could not help but see how many of the individuals in the crowd were either former ranchers themselves or former staff. Eric's former cottage parents were there, and I heard them speak of how much they loved Eric and looked upon him like a son.

Setting Goals for Success

he stage was set: 12 campers on a large, teetering, wooden platform. The goal? To keep it level for no less than 20 seconds. While on the surface, the task may sound simple, but the endeavor requires an incredible amount of teamwork to



accomplish successfully.

For the campers, that is an important lesson. "Being a good leader is learning to be a good follower," Senior Program Leader Mr. Phillips says as he coaches from the sidelines. Each camper

thought they were the individual key to solving the problem single-handedly. They were not willing to compromise to work together.

As you would imagine, with the entire group moving back and forth at the same

time, the seesaw rocked chaotically up and down. Each one was shouting out their own ideas, making it impossible for anyone to listen. It wasn't long before several of the campers wanted to call it quits and be done with the exercise. "How did

the other group



do it?" one of the young girls asked, wondering if the goal could even be accomplished. "They concentrated, they committed, they communicated, they cooperated," Mr. Phillips replied. "You're a team. You have to decide." It was then that things started to sink in. The campers all stopped moving. As a unit, they sat down and began to take turns making suggestions. They finally started working as a team to meet their goals.



Through the woods, on the other side of camp, more campers were learning about setting goals at a separate obstacle course. The high-ropes course raises campers above the ground and has them walking across suspended wooden poles and balancing on a tightrope-style wire course. "It teaches self-esteem and goal setting," explained Ms. Shepherd, Camp Director and Certified Ropes Instructor. "If your goal is just to get to the top of the ladder, that's fine. If it's to do the whole course, that's great." She urged ranchers to "Set your own goals. It's a challenge by choice."

Each participant had to set a goal for how much they wanted to accomplish and how far they wanted to go—how much of their fear they would choose to face. "I was a bit scared," Katherine, one of the campers, admitted as she took off her helmet and walked away from the course after a successful run. "But I was brave and tried my best."

As their peers cheered them on from below, each one took to the catwalk. "My goal was to finish," Breyana said with excitement as she skipped over to the group. "The hardest part was staying balanced," she added with a smile. "It feels great to have completed it!" When campers aren't doing challenge courses at the camp, they can often be found at the springs. Deleon Springs claims to be the site of the fountain of youth and, on any given summer afternoon, it is definitely the hot spot for some of our youth.

Even on these days, the learning and cooperation never stop. Campers Jarod and Andrew eagerly loaded into canoes and prepared to hit the water. Their counselor, Mr. P.C., instructed them on how and where to sit and explained the two-paddle system with one paddle in front and another in back. Mr. P.C. sat in the back and took the lead as the stern man, controlling the direction of the canoe. Jarod filled the role of bowman—the person at the front of the canoe responsible for paddling. Without both paddlers, and without communication, the canoe wouldn't go anywhere. Without a goal destination, they would simply be adrift on the water.

For these campers, each day and each event is an accomplishment. At the highropes course, campers learn to set goals and to challenge themselves. The canoers learned to set a goal and cooperate to get where they were going, and the campers on the seesaw had to communicate, cooperate and commit; they couldn't create balance on the board without those behaviors.



With all the lessons learned, the hope is that at the end of the week, they take these skills with them outside camp to set goals and find a better balance in their everyday lives. \star

Not only did Yabey want to help out, he also has a passion for food that he began to cultivate during his senior year of high school. The teen, who plans on attending culinary school in the fall, is actually an award-winning chef! He placed second in a recent state competition. For Yabey, this summer has been a win-win situation: "I get to work with kids and I love getting to work in the kitchen."

While Jacob spends his time on campus at the Boys Ranch as a lifeguard (story

Putting Service First: The Honor of the Guard

"People didn't think I could do it," states Jacob proudly. "I wanted to prove them wrong, and I've always loved the water."

Jacob's journey to becoming a lifeguard is nothing short of impressive. Not only was there a lot of swimming—12 laps back and forth in the pool, to be exact but he also had to tread water for two minutes, then perform the extraction of an actual person simulating an emergency, physically removing them and saving them from the pool. Out of the water, the teen had to pass three separate written exams consisting of more than 150 total questions, watch a series of videos, and learn numerous lifesaving techniques.

For Jacob, it was all worth it. His favorite part of the job is the reward of watching kids who didn't know how to swim gain the knowledge and skills to become confident swimmers.

Jacob is a walking testament to the power of what the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch and their tireless staff can do for children. He came to the Ranch when an endless series of parties caught up with the teen and he fell far behind in school. He realized that he needed help.

Heavily influenced by the philosophy of the Boys Ranch, Jacob has developed a genuine spirit of service, helping out whenever there is a need. During the hot summer months, he can usually be found on guard by the pool for a couple of hours each day, positioned front and center between the deep end and the shallow side of the pool—a good vantage point is a key part of a lifeguard's success.

Lifeguarding isn't always easy. "It's hard getting kids to listen sometimes," Jacob confesses. Taking extra care to make sure everyone at the pool is following the rules can be taxing, but safety comes first. As a lifeguard, he maintains that the best lifeguards never have to really save anyone. "If you make sure to instruct the swimmers and enforce the basic rules, you won't have any bigger issues," he says. Aside from breaking up some roughhousing, Jacob's lifeguarding watch has been pretty smooth sailing.

His helping nature and heart for service has also guided his future career plans. The 18-year-old high school senior has plans to attend the police academy and pursue a career in law enforcement.

For Jacob, whether he is at the pool, in the kitchen or looking to the future, it is always an honor to serve. ★



A t the Youth Ranches, it's hard not to want to share every story of tremendous growth our kids experience in such a short amount of time in our care. The resilient nature of children in general is inspiring enough, but when it comes to our senior Angel, she really takes the cake.

Growing up, Angel lived with her grandmother who suffered from health issues. Given her condition, it made it hard for her to raise and provide adequate support for Angel. In school, Angel was severely bullied and, because of that and challenges in her home life, her grades began to suffer. Angel became very depressed and closed-off which had a major impact on her relationships with others, her grandmother being the most affected. At the age of 16, Angel decided that she needed some sort of intervention. After doing her own research, she came across the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches.

Two years later, Angel has brought her GPA from a 0.5 to a 3.0 and has even gotten involved in school activities. She was determined to graduate on time with the rest of her class, so she finished a total of 18 classes in her senior year alone! Angel has also developed close bonds with her cottage parents, made many friends on campus and mended the broken relationship with her grandmother. She has won multiple academic awards, including the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches Program Director Award, which is the most prestigious award that a child in our care can receive.

Angel's overall growth and development has been nothing short of a miracle. She is now 18 years old and has huge plans for her future. She is living in Sebring and pursuing a degree in marine biology at



her local state college as part of the Youth Ranches Scholarship Program.

When you ask Angel what the Youth Ranches means to her, she says its hope. Before coming to us, she had no aspirations for the future because she didn't believe in herself. Having seen the work she can produce when she puts her mind to something, Angel has found a whole new sense of self-confidence that she never knew she was capable of. In only two years, Angel has turned her life completely around.

Our donor family helps provide the right environment in which kids can thrive! A warm, stable home with caring adults; educational support; and active teaching of job skills makes the difference in the lives of the children we serve.

It has been said that children heal faster than adults do and, at the Youth Ranches, we are reassured of this on a daily basis. Angel is living proof. \star



Marine Conservation and Education

f sending a group of kids out for a day with sharks sounds like a recipe for disaster, normally you would be right. However, with the help of Shark Conservation Center President Dylan Faulkner at Eckerd College and his team, fun and education were the only items on the menu for this day.

The Shark Conservation Center(SCC) is dedicated to educating the community about the importance of protecting and preserving marine wildlife. When it comes to educating the community about conservation, there is no better place to start than kids.

The SCC invited the Youth Ranch at Safety Harbor to learn about sharks and other marine wildlife as a part of an outreach program. So far, the program has been met with rave reviews by our children and the scientists alike.

The first experience with the SCC found a group of residents from Safety Harbor traveling to Eckerd College to visit the marine biology students and team at their lab in person. The kids took on the role of junior scientists as the conservation team taught them about local wildlife and its importance to the local ecosystem.

Once the indoor educational program was over, it was time for a little handson training. The kids and the SCC team loaded up and went out to the beach near the Sunshine Skyway Bridge in Tampa

Bay. There, the team and the kids were able to find numerous sea creatures, including seahorses and starfish. They collected these specimens, catalogued them and took them back to the lab to be studied by the marine biology students and Youth Ranch residents.

Faulkner and his team could not be more excited to continue working with the residents at Safety Harbor. Dylan hopes he has inspired a kid or two to pursue a career in science or marine biology.





A Second Chance

The beginning of Josh's story is like that of so many of the young people we serve. He and his sister were being raised by a single mother in Miami who was working diligently to make ends meet. However, while his mother was hard at work, Josh's grades began a steady decline, his disobedience reached a peak, and his relationship with his mother and sister hit rock bottom. Josh found himself roaming the streets and tangled up with a bad crowd. Academically, Josh's troubles became most evident when he failed his seventh-grade year.

Josh and his family were at their wits' end when someone suggested the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches. He soon found himself at the Youth Ranch Bradenton-Sarasota campus. "It was voluntary, but I really didn't want to be there," the now 24-year-old man admitted, recalling his

feelings when he first came to the Ranch as a child. "I felt really alone—like I didn't belong."

Josh was born in New York and raised in Miami, so the shift from big cities to the smaller community of Bradenton was difficult at first. "It was a very different environment," Josh recalled. "I was upset." Without the hustle and bustle of city life and the distractions he had left behind, Josh suddenly found himself with the opportunity to think with a clear head. "I started doing a lot of reflection," he explained. "And I realized I had a lot of things to work on."

Not only did the staff begin to teach him life and social skills, they helped him get back on track academically. "The staff is so dedicated," Josh said. "They helped me learn how to stay focused." He began to excel academically. Earning the Student of the Year Award is an accomplishment Josh is proud of to this day.

After spending more than three years at the Ranch, Josh was ready to go home to his mother and sister. The lessons he

learned at the Ranch were never far from his mind or his heart. "The Ranch really taught me how to handle things, mentally and emotionally," he said. "They taught me how to overcome adversity."

After leaving the Ranch, Josh's relationship with his family has also grown stronger, and he values it more deeply than before. He and his mother are closer than ever. His sister, whom he used to constantly fight with, now shares an incredibly tight bond. "Before, she was just a sibling," Josh adds. "Now, she's my sister."

Through the Ranch mentor and scholarship program, Josh was able to stay

on track. He recently graduated from the University of Tampa with his bachelor's degree in Advertising and Public Relations. "The Youth Ranch has been with me every step of the way," Josh savs with sincerity.

"They are a second family."

With the help of the Ranch and staff, Josh not only pursued his education; he has a career in banking. He began working part-time as a teller, and JP Morgan Chase offered him a full-time position after his graduation. He now has a career development path with the bank. His plan is to become a relationship banker and work with small businesses in the Tampa Bay area. "I love helping clients and developing relationships." Josh beams with excitement over his career and future.

His desire to help doesn't just end at work. Josh has also been volunteering his time with local charities, including Metropolitan Ministries in Tampa. "I just want to be the best that I can be," he says with purpose. "I want to do more for the community. I want to give back."

Josh definitely recognizes that he has been fortunate to have been given the opportunity to set things in the right direction all those years ago, and to receive the continued support of the Ranch. "Growing up is sometimes easier said than done," he says. "If you work with the Ranch, they will work with you. I feel really blessed to be where I am. I got a second shot. I'm fortunate." ★
