


Youth Ranches Board Member mourned

Dr. Nessi was a true friend and will be sorely missed by everyone.


For Henry — a day to remember

JACKSONVILLE — This was a banner year for Boys Ranch Alumnus Henry Rauch, 28, who left the Boys Ranch in 1982 after three years. Henry intended to get his diploma, but somehow things just never worked out. After a friend challenged Henry to go with him to finish the required work for a GED diploma, Henry decided to accept that challenge. He and the friend attended Florida Community College in Jacksonville and Henry was among the proud graduates who walked across the stage to accept that long-awaited GED diploma last May.

"I took the course while I was at the Boys Ranch, but I didn't pass parts of it. When I took it at FCCJ, I thought I had failed it," Henry remembered. "In the spring the college called and said I had passed. I argued with them, but they said the computer had messed up originally when it indicated I had not passed," he said. "It made me happy that I finally passed," Henry commented. Within a week, Henry had his diploma in hand. Still, he decided to go through the full graduation ceremony where he was officially graduated, cap, gown and official handshake!

In 1982 Henry left the Boys Ranch where he had lived in Pentland Cottage. The first two years he lived and worked in Live Oak as a custodial engineer with a church. Henry decided job prospects would be better in a larger city so he moved to Jacksonville to live with his grandmother. He was right. Soon, he was employed with a security firm where he worked for nearly four years. For the past two years, Henry has been employed as a security officer with Pinkerton Security Corporation.

Henry hasn't forgotten the Boys Ranch. Each year he returns for open house in October, arriving



on Friday to help wherever needed. His favorite spot is serving chicken pilau on Friday afternoon, dipping huge spoonfuls of the delicious concoction onto guests' plates. If his job doesn't require his presence in Jacksonville, he helps with the huge barbecue on Saturday. He's active in the Alumni Association and frequently works behind the scenes to help former Ranchers. Youth Ranches staff members describe Henry as committed, reliable, and a Christian young man.




What Thanksgiving means to me





Why, there were campers, motor homes, and tents as far as the eyes could see.




rides, open house tours of the Boys Ranch buildings, and just plain having a good time in the country.






Ranchers and alumni who have shown a deep commitment to the welfare of the boys.



Clay Mavericks Riding Club shaped future of open house

The Clay Mavericks Riding Club has been a Youth Ranches friend since the early days of the Boys Ranch.

In the late 60s, club members volunteered to build a horse show arena at the Boys Ranch, provided equipment and labor, and completed the arena during the dead of winter. During this time they were putting on a yearly benefit for the Youth Ranches.

The first horse show was held in the arena during open house in October 1971. Now, 20 years later, the Clay Mavericks' commitment to the Youth Ranches is stronger than ever.

The first horse show was an addition to the more formal open house and dedication service at the Boys Ranch. Little did anyone know that this first horse show would change the annual gathering of hundreds to thousands, and make jeans, boots, and cowboy hats the order of the day.

Clay Mavericks members still oversee the horse show. It has grown from a small, one-day event to three with a record 523 entries this year! Clay Mavericks President Linda Worthington says the growth led to the formation of the Northeast Florida Horseman's Association (NFHA), of which she is also president. NFHA includes various riding clubs around the Orange Park area whose members ride at Boys Ranch and shoulder part of the workload during the annual three-day event.

"We had a part in designing the new announcer's booth and helped raise the money to construct it," Linda said. "We plan the program each year to insure that we don't have games that are dangerous," she added.

Husband Don, who has served as Clay Mavericks president at least five times, thinks the annual weekend at the Boys Ranch is the best thing to come along since grits and gravy. "Horseback riding is the best thing for kids. I'm convinced of it," he says. Don says when youngsters are feeding, grooming, training, and riding horses, they don't have time to get into trouble.

"When others are off doing things without their kids, we are with ours, encouraging them, watching them, and competing against them. It's fun," Linda said of the riding club.

When the Worthingtons first came to the Boys Ranch in 1972 with the Clay Mavericks, there were 125 riders. "That was a really big show. And, we

had no lights!" Linda remembered.

The club is made up of about 20 families who spend each Saturday night riding in competition either at its arena on Tanglewood Boulevard in Orange Park, or nearby with another club. These days, the third generation of Clay Mavericks are attending open house at the Boys Ranch with their parents and grandparents.

Clay Mavericks members believe the open house weekends have strengthened their commitment to the Youth Ranches. "We enjoy it, especially raising the money to see to it these youngsters have a better life," Linda admits. "They are all so nice. We enjoy being around them."

Clay Mavericks are among the major donors to the Youth Ranches. Since its first gift July 13, 1966, the club has contributed more than \$39,000 in cash for a total contribution of \$42,730.26!

Manatee River Youth Ranch merges with Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches

BRADENTON - On Oct. 1 the Manatee River Youth Ranch in Bradenton merged with the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches to become the sixth program operated by the Youth Ranches. The new program will be known as the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch near Bradenton.

The merger took place after careful consideration by Youth Ranches staff, board members, and consultation with the Florida Sheriffs Association Board members.

An informal ceremony heralding the merger of the 60-plus-acre facility with the Youth Ranches was held in the spacious cottage at the ranch where 10 troubled youngsters live. Youth Ranches President Harry K. Weaver and Manatee River Youth Ranch Board President Barbara Smith placed their signatures on the official documents to finalize the agreement. The historical event was witnessed by Youth Ranches and Youth Ranches Foundation staff; members of the Manatee River Youth Ranch Board of Directors: Sheriff Geoffrey Monge of Sarasota County, who also serves as Youth Ranches Board of Directors Vice Chairman; and staff

The Youth Ranches immediately assumed financial and operational responsibility for the ranch, which was free of indebtedness with approx-

Announcement of the impending merger was made August 26 during a joint press conference at the Manatee County Sheriff's Office by Sheriff Charlie Wells of Manatee County and Sheriff Geoffrey Monge. Present for that historic event were Presidents Barbara B. Smith and Harry K. Weaver; Mrs. Pat Glass, Chairman of the Manatee County Commission; former Manatee River Youth Ranch President and Executive Committee Member Bill Beckley; and other dignitaries. Final preparations were made, and on Oct. 1, the final merger took place amid a lot of happy faces.

The ranch, located 15 miles east of Bradenton, also has a large, beautiful barn, the Selby Horse Pavilion; one spacious cottage with room for a dozen youth, a large equipment shed which hopefully will be made into a maintenance shed as funds are available; and

one mobile home for staff.

The entrance features two large columns flanked by a white fence. Youth Ranches signs with the star logo were put in place immediately after the merger. A paved road winds past the buildings.

The residential home began in 1984 with the help of the Bradenton Kiwanis Club. A Manatee River Youth Ranch Task Force Committee was formed, and in 1988 the Manatee County Commission signed a 99-year agreement with the Manatee River Youth Ranch for use of the county-owned land.

The ranch was formed to "provide abused, neglected, homeless and runaway children with a residential program which provides support and guidance, promotes their health, social, education, vocational, and character development." Many of the youth who reside there now are HRS funded.

In the short time the ranch has been in operation, its board has done an outstanding job of obtaining support. Community support has been superb, and many of the community's leaders are vitally interested in its welfare and have served on the Manatee River Youth Ranch Board. That board now is the Youth Ranch Board of Associates and serves in a supportive capacity. It is believed that because of the intense community pride in the program and concentrated support for the Youth Ranches in Manatee and Sarasota counties, the program will become one of the most vital programs operated by the Youth Ranches. This merger will give the Youth Ranches the opportunity to serve more and more troubled youngsters closer

to their homes.

Youth Ranches Regional Director Dr. Bill Aust will oversee the program. Youth Ranch Resident Director Elaine Dutton officially began her duties Nov. 4. Former Manatee River Youth Ranch Executive Director Bill Brown comes aboard as Youth Ranch Vice President Planned Giving.

Doug was headed for big trouble, but the Boys Ranch turned him around

Doug Graham was headed the wrong way before he was old enough to know right from wrong.

At the age of five, he was hanging around a rough crowd and learning the basics for trouble.

"I got to goin' with this gang, and I got into breakin' headlights and windshields," Doug recalled recently while letting his memory drift back over a span of some 30 years.

Doug was simply doing what the adult hoodlums in his neighborhood were telling him to do, Doug said, but his behavior got so bad, his mother decided to send him away to school in hopes it would change his attitude. Unfortunately, Doug said, instead of receiving positive direction, he became the victim of cruel punishment.

When Doug came home for Christmas that year, he told his mother of the abuse and she decided not to return him to school. The family decided to move to Florida.


This was a new setting, but it produced the same old problems. "Yes," said Doug, "same thing. Mama had to work all the time, and I was left at home with my grandmother. I got with some guys and started staying out late." Before long, Doug was on the verge of real trouble.

Sooner or later Doug would have ended up in juvenile court, but something happened that eventually turned his life around. In 1967, his mother made a last-ditch effort to save her son and filed an application to have him enrolled in the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch. He was accepted.

Twenty-four years later Doug can recall that momentous event with sincere gratitude, but at the time all he felt was fear.

"I was scared because of my bad experience at the school," he said, "but after about a year, I knew the Boys Ranch was the best thing that ever happened to me."

Once Doug got over his fear of the Boys Ranch, he started getting involved in competitive sports, and he learned to take responsibility by doing his share of the Ranch chores. His self-esteem went up several notches when he captured a calf in a 4-H Club calf scramble, raised it, entered it in the

Suwannee County Fair competition, and won a Grand Champion ribbon.

Doug applied for and was accepted to work at the Boys Ranch farm where he learned about tractors, horses, cows, compassion for animals, and lots of hard work.

The former Rancher's eyes still light up when he describes the fun he had riding horses in competition. "We went to horse shows in places like Branford and Jacksonville, and we won trophies and ribbons. After we did our chores at the farm, we could get the horses and get out there and practice barrel racing."

Growing up at the Ranch wasn't endless fun. There were times when Doug had to be disciplined. But 30-years later he looks back on those times as character-building experiences. "They taught me, if you do this wrong thing, you will pay for it down the road," he said. "Discipline was the thing that kept me straight."

Bit by bit the Boys Ranch turned Doug around

and pointed him in the right direction. He completed a course in auto mechanics, received a high school diploma, found his first full-time job at the White Springs plant of Occidental Chemical Corporation in 1974, and began making it on his own.

In 1976 the old recruiting invitation to "join the Marines and see the world," lured Doug into the military, and he had plans to make it a career. Doug didn't see the "Halls of Montezuma" or the "Shores of Tripoli" during his hitch in the Marines, but he did see many ports of call such as Dominican Republic, Aruba, California, Brazil, and Guatanamo Bay, Cuba. He reached the rank of sergeant in three years, won a trophy for his expert marksmanship, and was awarded decorations for good conduct and sea duty. A knee injury put him on disabled status after four and a half years, and he was honorably discharged.


Returning to civilian life wasn't difficult for Doug because Oxy Chem had allowed him to take military leave, and he had no difficulty returning to the Mines Services Division at the White Springs plant with his seniority intact.

Using his GI Bill benefits, Doug took a welding course at night, and this training, plus the auto mechanics training he received while living at the Boys Ranch, helped him to arrange a transfer to the Maintenance Department.

Currently he's a Combination Repairman on the Maintenance Department's Fabrication Crew, a team of 11 expert craftsmen capable of building huge pieces of equipment for all areas of the chemical complex. Day by day he encounters a wide variety of challenges, and he responds to them with skills he has learned on the job.

"We weld aluminum. We weld stainless — all

kinds of stainless," Doug explained. "If you see something built out of steel, we built it . . . just anything like hand rails, platforms, pipes and tanks."

The former Rancher seems to be successful and enthusiastic in his present job, but his achievements are not limited to that area alone. He has been attending Lake City Community College in his spare time and expects to receive an associate of arts degree there in 1992.

That will be another boost for the self-esteem he started building at the Boys Ranch, but apparently not the last one. "I'm thinking of going on for a four-year degree," Doug told a *Rancher* interviewer. He said he might have to skip around picking up courses at colleges and universities within a reasonable radius of White Springs, but that obviously doesn't discourage him.

Doug and his wife, Kim, live in White Springs, and she is employed in Lake City as a bookkeeper. They have two children; Andy, 15, and Kyle, 6, but Doug seems to be mentally prepared to handle the multiple responsibilities of job, family and academic pursuits.

Meanwhile, he's keeping in touch with the Boys Ranch by maintaining an active membership in the Alumni Association. He also organizes and coaches basketball and softball teams to give the Ranch boys some outside competition.

Living at the Boys Ranch was one of the best things that ever happened to him, Doug says.

Perhaps this young man, who was once headed for big trouble, will turn out to be one of the best things that ever happened to the Boys Ranch.





Ranchers are guests of Russian ship captain







Summer Camp changes lives

Youth from a wide variety of backgrounds attend the Youth Ranches Summer Camp each year. Some have had problems at school. Others have had some brief run-in with the law although not yet at the delinquent stage. Still others come from homes where abusive situations make the words "love" and "understanding" almost nonexistent. Many boys and girls attend because their parents have experienced financial difficulties and cannot afford to send their children to camp. Because there is never a charge to attend Youth Ranches Summer Camp, no one is left out for financial reasons.

In 1991, there were many positive experiences for these youngsters. Some learned to swim. A girl we will call Amy, 11, had never been in a pool before. For days she struggled during pool activities. By the end of camp, Amy was no longer afraid of the water. She was not ready to compete in Olympic events, but she had learned enough to save herself should she get into trouble in the water. For Amy, this was a real milestone.

Accomplishments mean a lot to our campers. Most have had few positive experiences in their young lives and desperately need to know that their life really does matter; that they can contribute. A young man, age 12, picked up a bow and arrow for the first time in his life, received hands-on instruction from deputies and staff members, and after a few attempts, placed an arrow directly in the center of the bull's eye! The look of exhilaration that spread across his face will remain with me for life.

Often, it's difficult to give youth a good experience because many believe they don't deserve to succeed and resist any attempts to help them. Such was the case of Mac, a young man who this summer attended camp only to find out that structure and discipline were the rule rather than the exception. As soon as he discovered that we follow rules, he rebelled violently, both physically and verbally.

Mac, 13, was assigned to Camp Timucuan where campers who need special attention live. Here, deputies and staff members work one-on-one with difficult youth, teaching them responsibility, mutual respect, and structure. Mac learned to find firewood, build a fire, plan menus, set schedules, and design activities for himself and his instructors. Within three days, Mac's attitude had changed so drastically





that he returned to the regular campsites with one of his counselors and became a junior counselor! By the end of camp, Mac had set an example of leadership for the younger campers. What started out as a bad experience turned into a bright spot and led Mac to a realization that the Youth Camp theme, "Law officers are your friends," is really true.

Mac, the young archer, and Amy weren't the only youth who were helped by Summer Camp. There were nearly 500 others. Some received counseling for specific problems, others received a great deal of guidance in dealing with situations that hopefully will keep them out of street gangs and will guide them when they encounter negative peer groups.

Youngsters arrive hesitant, not quite sure what they will encounter. By the end of the session, however, these same boys and girls cling to law officers and counselors as the tears flow at parting. There is no embarrassment among the campers or adults when they use affectionate phrases such as, "I will never forget you," and "I love you."

Without the gifts of our donor family, these lives cannot be touched — these lives cannot be directed toward a new path, away from crime and drugs, and lives of destruction.

Weaver was tricked — and treated

Ninety-nine and nine-tenths of the time Youth Ranches President Harry K. Weaver is in control. Night and day he has his hand on the tiller. If he merely coughs or clears his throat in his office near Live Oak, employees as far removed as Fort Myers and Stuart snap to attention.

However, there was a brief period in the early part of this year when his iron grip slipped briefly, and employees conspired secretly to outmaneuver him.

Plans were being made for the annual employee recognition banquet, and the planners agreed that the awards should include a 30-year plaque for HKW. They also agreed that if HKW got wind of their intentions he would veto the scheme.

To plot or not to plot, that was the question, and, with mutinous glee the Central Office conspirators decided to go ahead with their intrigue by ordering a handsome plaque.

The unauthorized award was smuggled into the recognition banquet recently and HKW was duly honored as the first 30-year employee in the 34-year history of the Youth Ranches.

Carl Stauffer, the Editor of *The Rancher* and former Executive Director of the Florida Sheriffs Association, set the stage for the plaque presentation by recalling how he had persuaded Weaver, a federal court probation officer, to take control of the faltering, problem-plagued Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch near the end of 1961.

"It was a turning point that saved the Ranch from disaster," said Stauffer, "but what did it do for Harry Weaver? It put him in a very tough spot, that's what it did.

"He had come to the Ranch expecting challenges, but now he found them exploding all around him like land mines . . . in the laundry, in the kitchen, on the farm, and in the residential cottages. The Ranch was understaffed. Morale was low. Some of the staff members had not had a day off in six months.

"Consequently, the administrator's office chair gathered dust while the administrator was rushing from crisis to crisis. In those hectic days, he alternated between washing clothes in the laundry, cooking meals, running the farm, and injecting some semblance of order into cottages occupied by 20-24 rambunctious boys."

Stauffer said Weaver had the situation well in hand by the end of 1962, and the "march of progress" that evolved into the present Youth Ranches organi-


DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches maintains 48.64 miles of fencing at its residential programs and Indiantown property? The Youth Ranches maintains 7.25 miles of paved and 16.40 miles of unpaved roads at the Boys Ranch near Live Oak, Youth Villa near Bartow, Youth Ranch in Safety Harbor, Youth Camp near Barberville, and Caruth Camp near Inglis/Yankeetown.

The Boys Ranch has 54 buildings or structures that must be painted, roofed, cleaned, repaired, or cared for in various ways. This excludes the watersphere, sewage plant, water and sewer lines, tennis courts, swimming pool, streets and fences.

Gift Annuity ... A Gift That Gives and Provides Payments For Life



What is a charitable gift annuity?

A charitable gift annuity is a gift to help troubled boys and girls in Florida while providing a guaranteed lifetime income for the donor.

It is an irrevocable agreement by which you make a gift to a qualified charitable organization and receive fixed payments for life. It is also a gift since part of the payment is given for a non-profit cause. Charitable gift annuities are recognized by state and federal authorities as a way to make a gift, and they have been around for many, many years.

The amount of income one receives is based upon the amount of the gift and the age of the donor. The older the donor, the higher the gift annuity rate.

A portion of the gift is immediately tax deductible as is a portion of the income.

Organizations issuing gift annuities are required by Florida law to meet precise financial standards and be registered. The Youth Ranches was the first organization in Florida to be issued a permit to write charitable gift annuities. The Youth Ranches permit number is DAAP-74-1. The Committee on Gift Annuities meets every three years to set the uniform annuity rates and the Youth Ranches is a sponsoring organization of this group.



As many of you noticed during the 34th Anniversary celebration, the giant lighted star on the hill at Boys Ranch is gone. Plans are underway to re-construct the star with permanent materials, and you, our donor family, can be part of this effort.

In 1987, Youth Ranches alumni staff members J. B. "Jim" and Helen Brettingen designed and built the star in honor of the Youth Ranches' 30th anniversary. This was one of many projects the Brettingens so graciously completed for the Youth Ranches over the years. But, this project was different. The star was a replica of the Youth Ranches logo, and it became symbolic of the Youth Ranches to our boys, staff, alumni, and friends. It became a ritual for visitors to have their photos made in front of it, and was considered a landmark. Sadly, it was the last project Jim Brettingen designed for his beloved Boys Ranch before he died of cancer in 1990.

The star was built to last one year, but somehow we just couldn't remove that star. Alas, the base began to deteriorate and a storm nearly toppled the star in late summer. Reluctantly, we took down the five-year-old star before it could fall and injure



someone. Now, the hill is dark. When visitors approach the Boys Ranch, there is no star to welcome them.

Many attending the 34th Anniversary asked to be part of this project. Glenn East, Southside Saddle Club President of Jacksonville, immediately volunteered to head up the drive to raise the \$10,000-\$12,000 needed to build a permanent star.
