On two separate occasions, current and former staff, along with former Ranchers — many with their own families — came together at our Boys Ranch Chapel to honor these men and their own families. They came to say farewell and thank you for making a difference in the lives of so many.



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While there were no parades or long processions, there were speeches, and better yet, testimonies from the men who were once boys living and learning under the watchful eyes of these two outstanding role models. There were also tears, smiles and laughter as stories were told by staff, family members and alumni. I heard more than once an outpouring of love and devotion that our alumni held for both of these heroes. While Pop Davis' wife, Sandy, had previously passed, Pop Barnett's wife, Francis, was there in attendance, and the men who were once boys in her cottage embraced her and repeatedly referred to her as "Mom".

For me, this was a very special moment to say goodbye or "see you later". I knew and respected these two men because I saw their unconditional love for children. They, along with their wives, dedicated themselves to helping the boys and girls who call the Youth Ranches home, and they did it with passion! Not all heroes are nationally known figures. Some are ordinary people doing extraordinary things, like providing love and compassion to a hurting child.

Thank you to all of our Sheriffs, donors and supporters for allowing us the opportunity to serve so many children who are in desperate need of love and support. You, too, are our heroes because without your unconditional love for our children and generosity, we could not exist!

or board games; and many of our girls enjoy video games as well. For the girls at Dorista Cottage their activity room wasn't being used because, like a lot of young women in their teens, part of what they find fun to do in their spare time is experiment with hair and makeup.

So the girls got together, created a plan, and pitched the idea to their cottage parents on a better use of the room. They were worried such a big change would be too far outside the box, but they discussed the pros and cons of remodeling the space and pleaded their case.

The biggest pro: The room would finally be useful again.

a small thing, for many young women it is a way to express their individuality, it helps them build confidence and many even see

"We've never had a real Christmas," Aiden said, as he shook a box neatly wrapped with colorful paper, trying to figure out what gift was hidden inside.

He wasn't saying it to be dramatic or to try to get the chance to open his gifts early. It was just a quiet comment to his sister, Alexis.

The truth is, for the fifth-grader and his older sister, their lives before the Youth Ranches had been anything but consistent and being able to celebrate Christmas each year wasn't a given.

"My favorite part of Christmas is the food," Alexis said with a smile as she carefully read the instructions to assemble an artificial pre-lit tree. "This is the first time I have ever put together a Christmas tree," she said, enjoying the tedious work of bending the branches into a full and iconic tree shape.

Aiden and Alexis are like a lot of children across the state of Florida. Simple joys like unwrapping Christmas gifts or decorating a Christmas tree aren't guaranteed to them. For so many underprivileged and needy boys and girls across the state, their next meal isn't guaranteed, and celebrating the holidays isn't something they know they are missing out on.

Our sibling program has allowed the pair to stay not only at the same campus, but in the same cottage as well. However, the transition from being bounced around to coming to the stability of the Youth Ranches hasn't been completely easy. There have been some outbursts, a few tears and a learning curve to understand what is expected of them, but the pair has been excelling. Now, with no hesitation, they know the Youth Ranch as their home. Alexis, who struggled to find her niche in town school, is thriving with a little more individualized attention at the on-campus Cooke School and now looks forward to her walk to school each morning. Aiden, like a lot of boys, doesn't love school, but he is incredibly bright and his favorite subjects are math and science.

School is a top priority at the Youth Ranches, but if Aiden is honest, sometimes his main focus is his little league football team, the Gators. Both he and his sister know they finally have the opportunity for a stable life with people who truly care about them, their well-being and their future.

Many children like Aiden and Alexis come from home lives they didn't choose. It wasn't their choice to have no other options than to call the Boys Ranch home, but because of you, they never want to leave.

"I want to stay here!" Alexis said passionately. "I want to graduate high school and go to college."

Aiden and Alexis got to have their first real Christmas at the Boys Ranch. There was a tree, an amazing meal, a banquet and even presents. Best of all, they got to celebrate with cottage parents who care about them and dozens of new Rancher brothers and sisters.

These are the basics: every Rancher is expected to keep their room clean, do their own laundry and help with chores around the cottage. They are not paid for these chores but are expected to do them as a part of the cottage family.

In addition to their daily chores, each child has a specific job on or off campus. In order to get a job, just as in the real world, they must fill out an application

Some of the skills we are able to teach our Ranchers include operating large equipment, such as zeroturn mowers, tractors and vehicles. Ranchers can also find their calling with cooking and food management or horticulture and landscaping, recreation, agriculture, livestock, general maintenance, plumbing and more.

In addition, several of our students work at the local Sheriffs Ranches Enterprises Thrift Stores and local restaurants learning customer

maintenance, food services with Aramark, groundskeeping, mechanics or office work. Some jobs require special skills, and Ranchers may have to show proficiency through a test to use tools or equipment. When a Rancher shows a specific interest or aptitude in other areas, additional

In their job, Ranchers earn a paycheck. Each Rancher has a savings account and is taught how to budget, which enables us to teach financial responsibility. More service skills and gaining valuable retail experience.

FAILURE ····· IS AN · OPTION




ave you ever heard the phrase, "Failure is not an option"? Wow, talk about pressure! Yet it is a phrase that is used on so many different levels: A high school football coach telling his players, "Go out there and win! And remember — failure is not an option." Or an employer telling their employees when working on a project that "failure is not an option". To some, this phrase might be thought of as motivational, a projection of confidence and possibly inspiring. To others it could be seen as challenging, provoking and inducing fear.

Fear is a powerful motivator. Fear of failure can either motivate or deflate someone trying to accomplish a task, goal or maybe a new activity. This is because others often look at failure as something weak or bad and see the person involved in the same light. Maybe this is why many of our children are afraid to try new things, struggle to make friends and too often say, "I can't do that." without even trying. After all, many were told over and over again that they were failures, worthless, unlovable and at times even worse.

When I was a boy, three friends and I decided to build a boat. We were 11 and 12. For an entire summer, we built a boat using scrap lumber found at construction sites throughout the neighborhood. We used leftover nails, emptied the remaining putty out of used up putty tubes, scraped paint cans empty until we had a full gallon and more. It took us the entire summer to build that 12-by-3-foot flat-bottom boat, but built it we did. On the day of our maiden float trip, the boat sank into about 3 feet of water about 30 yards offshore. It remains there today.

Here at the Boys Ranch, boys and girls in the past have worked with calves for months trying to get them trained to



enter them into the heifer showing at the county fair. They work daily with their calves, feeding them, brushing them, walking with them, and talking to them in soothing voices. Some youth have been injured in the process, but they continued, never giving up in hopes of winning a place in the showing. Then on the big day, in front of many spectators and judges, the young heifers do not react as planned in the judging arena. The ribbon they were



striving for was not awarded to them but to another child.

Each year we have a young artist series with our three central Florida campuses, where boys and girls spend weekends with various artists learning to paint, sculpt and more. Their artwork is later displayed at the St. Petersburg Museum of Art in one of their gallery sections for up to 10 days. Each year at least one or two pieces of art are chosen for our birthday and Christmas cards. However, that means many are not selected.

There are people who believe winning is everything. Some would argue successful people are winners, and losers are unsuccessful. I beg to differ: The boat my friends and I built sank, many of our boys and girls who work hard at preparing their calves to be showcased at the county fair never win a ribbon, and not all young artist's art is used for a special project. However, we all have something in common: WE TRIED! Winners try. They put themselves out there and they do their best even when knowing they might not succeed. You see, here at the Youth Ranches, "Failure is an Option!" It is not a negative



event but a positive one because when someone fails, it means they tried! Our kids come from all kinds of backgrounds. Some come to us scared, some worry about how others see them and some have been told that they would never succeed as they were already failures. But here in our homes and communities, they find encouragement, compassion and, most of all, opportunities to fail or succeed — because we celebrate the effort, not the outcome! *****



Washing Away the Past



HELPING HAND SOCIETY Family Legacies Come in Many Forms

Visiting with different donors, we get ideas about how they want their family to be remembered. Some choose to leave all their money and property directly to their family, hoping they will continue to support favorite charities. Others have made specific plans to ensure their charitable wishes are followed.

Here are a few of the more creative ideas we have seen in recent years:

- Naming the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy, retirement account or bank account
- Specifying a particular percentage of your estate for the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches <u>OR the opposite</u>, specifying a particular percentage or piece of property for your heirs and leaving the remainder of your estate to the Youth Ranches
- Investing in a Charitable Gift Annuity where the remainder after death goes to the Youth Ranches
- Making a cash gift of \$5,000 or more to the Youth Ranches in honor of a family member and request they be made a Lifetime Honorary Member of the Florida Sheriffs Association
- Contributing a minimum of \$10,000 and creating a family named endowment fund at the Youth Ranches



- Establishing a Charitable Remainder Trust where distributions (set amount or %) are made to family members for a period of years and once complete, the balance is donated to the Youth Ranches
- Establishing a Charitable Lead Trust where a distribution (% or set amount) is made to the Youth Ranches for a period of 10 or 20 years, then the balance is distributed to your heirs when they are older and better prepared to receive these funds

These are just a few options to consider. As always, we encourage you to discuss this with your personal attorney or advisors to chart the best course for your future and <u>remember to update</u> <u>your will annually</u> as things and people in your life change!

The lasting impact of Frank and Mae McCune

ne of the highlights of being funded by voluntary gifts from the public is we often get to sit down and talk with our donors in person and get to know them. They often talk about how they want their family to be remembered. Frank and Mae McCune created a legacy of generosity as they championed a mission of compassion throughout their lives.

The McCunes began giving to the Youth Ranches in the late 1970s. Mr. McCune said in an interview in 1993, "We were looking for an honest charitable organization that we could help. We wanted to share our good fortune with others while leaving a lasting tribute to Mae's mother... the deciding factor was learning that the Youth Ranches was run almost entirely on voluntary contributions, making it distinct from so many of these other organizations."

The McCunes were firm believers that every young man and woman had the potential for growth and development. They saw the work the Youth Ranches was doing and their efforts to prevent juvenile delinquency and made it their personal mission to help.





This was a mission that became their legacy.

Frank and Mae's interest in the Youth Ranches was not limited to financial support. During their lives they also gave of themselves. They visited several of our programs across the state and kept regular correspondence with some of the youth. Their investment in the lives of our youth was unique and exceptional in every way.

"If in our lifetime we can help save just one child...We'll consider our lives well spent."

This common quote was uttered on numerous occasions by Frank and Mae McCune; and not only were their lives well spent changing the future for thousands of children, their impact continues to be



felt as the McCune Foundation continues to help our mission to prevent delinquency and develop lawful, resilient and productive citizens.

The McCunes truly knew how to leave a lasting legacy and the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches are eternally grateful to them.

If you are curious how you can leave a lasting legacy, here are a few of the ideas we have seen in recent years:

• Naming the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches as a beneficiary of a life insurance policy, retirement account or bank account

• Specifying a particular percentage of your estate for the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches OR the opposite, specifying a particular percentage or piece of property for your heirs and leaving the remainder of your estate to the Youth Ranches

• Investing in a charitable gift annuity where the remainder after death goes to the Youth Ranches

• Making a cash gift of \$1,000 or more to the Youth Ranches in honor of a family member and request they be made a Lifetime Honorary Member of the Florida Sheriffs Association

• Contributing a minimum of \$10,000 and creating a family named endowment fund at the Ranch • Establishing a Charitable Remainder Trust where distributions (set amount or %) are made to family members for a period of years and once complete, the balance is donated to the Youth Ranches

• Establishing a Charitable Lead Trust where a distribution (% or set amount) is made to the Youth Ranches for a period of 10 or 20 years, then the balance is distributed to your heirs when they are older and better prepared to receive these funds



These are just a few options to consider. As always, we encourage you to discuss this with your personal attorney or advisors to chart the best course for your future and remember to update your will annually as things and people in your life change! ★



Glimpses of Success: Albert Willfams Driven to Serve

f you ever have the pleasure of being invited into the home of Albert Williams, you will quickly learn two undeniable truths about him: Albert loves his country and he loves the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches.

"Without the Ranch, we wouldn't be where we're at today." Albert said. "The Ranch saved our lives."

Albert and his two brothers, Ronnie and Tommy, were toeing the line of being on the wrong side of the law in the late 1950s. The trio was dangerously close to having criminal records, and their options seemed limited. The three young men were about to be split apart and sent to separate foster homes when the Boys Ranch intervened and made a promise to keep them together and let them grow up on our campus



together. In 1960, the young men came to the Boys Ranch to fulfill that promise.

When he was 10 years old, Al and his brothers found themselves with a new group of brothers and a cottage mom and pop who were ready to make sure they had

the best care and got their act together. For that love and attention Albert is eternally grateful. "I am what I am today, because of the Boys Ranch," he added.

Albert and his brothers were at the Boys Ranch from 1960 to 1969. The three young men graduated from high school in Live

Oak and later that same year Al joined the United States Air Force. He served four years in the military and is a Vietnam veteran and has never lost his passion for patriotism.

Even after leaving the Boys Ranch and spending time in the military, Albert always

makes time to come back home, as he refers to it. Since the 1970s, Albert and his brothers have been a fixture at Alumni events. Albert has also served in several positions in the Alumni Association. Keeping a strong Alumni Association is important to him. For Albert, it is like a family reunion, and he takes keeping this family together very seriously.

Albert can often be found behind the grill during events, making sure there is enough food and it is cooked

to perfection. He has never shied away from a little hard work, a trait the Boys Ranch taught and reinforced in him.



"I don't know where I'd be right now if it weren't for the Youth Ranches," Al said. "They helped make me the man I am today."

Thanks to the Youth Ranches, Al and his brothers received an education, had three square meals a day, had a loving home and, perhaps most importantly, had people who believed in them. They had high expectations placed on them, and they rose to meet the challenge.

Al worked as a diesel technician for many years before retiring, but retirement doesn't mean his commitment to the Boys Ranch has slowed down. If you ever run into Al, there are two things that are certain: He is going to greet you with a firm



handshake and a smile — and, even more than 50 years later, he is going to tell you about how the Boys Ranch saved his life. \star

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
