

Historical Perspective

When two Florida Sheriffs proposed an idea to establish a Ranch to help care for troubled boys, they never imagined the result of their simple dream. They saw a need in their communities to give wayward boys a home—someplace where they could learn to be productive citizens.

The original intention was simple. Give these boys a home where they could grow up safe and cared for while working through daily problems. The goal was to stop the spread of juvenile delinquency and keep children out of jail.

Over time, the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch continued to grow. Multiple residential campuses were opened throughout the state, serving boys, girls and sibling groups. In 1981, a summer camp program started on the Boys Ranch campus in tents and grew into three residential summer camps and the award-winning Harmony in the Streets mobile camp program.

Today, after 64 years, the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches is a statewide network of residential campuses, youth camping programs and community-based services. Beginning with a mere \$5,000 and 160 acres of donated land along the Suwannee River, the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches has now served over 172,000 boys, girls and their families.



Key Points

The Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches (FSYR) must be responsible to the donors who fund our charitable work with the children and families of Florida. We must earn your trust each and every day. Our credibility rests on a foundation of honesty, accountability, integrity and highquality service to the children and families of Florida.

- FSYR has once again earned the highest audit rating, known as an unmodified opinion, from the external audit firm of Batts Morrison Wales & Lee.
- FSYR is in a strong financial position with *no* debt.
- FSYR was the first organization in the state to be issued a Charitable Gift Annuity permit in 1974, and we maintain reserves in this fund equal to, or exceeding, state standards.
- FSYR is very conservative in the management of expenses. No portion of our direct mail appeals, donor correspondence or publications is considered an "educational or program-related" expense.


Furthermore, we do not hire professional fund-raising companies, *nor do we conduct any telephone solicitations*.



*Operational Revenue includes restricted gifts to be held for specific purposes that may extend into future fiscal years. Due to multiple construction projects, including a pool complex and improvements at Camp Sorensen, educational scholarships, and other items, there are \$6,930,271 for future use.

**Other Non-Operating Revenue:

- Investment income is booked at market value as of 9/30/21. Fluctuations in the market impact this number. FSYR spending policy only allows for 5% of investment gain to be used in a fiscal year.

- Paycheck Protection Program loans were applied for to ensure that funds were available to operate during the COVID-19 pandemic. These loans were forgiven and must now be shown as income.



2020–2021 Expenditures




Chart reflects percentages of operational expenses.





Programs & Services

Residential Care

Our trained and devoted staff is well-equipped to nurture needy, neglected boys and girls and provide a warm sense of security, guidance and tenderness. Youth are cared for by cottage parents who help each boy and girl develop a strong work ethic and a sense of responsibility, teamwork and respect.

Referral Services

Serving the 67 counties of Florida, we work with the families of children in our care. Our therapists are available to assist parents as necessary, offering supportive and referral services to the families of Florida.

Camping Services

Harmony in the Streets[®] is a mobile camping program that brings the four "R's" directly into local communities that may be socially and/or economically challenged. Our staff and Law Enforcement volunteers teach children to Respect Themselves, Respect Others, Respect Authority and Respect the Environment.

Harmony in the Schools is much like our Harmony in the Streets mobile camping program in that it brings leadership, cultural understanding and team-building skills directly into the schools. It encourages building relationships between students and peers as well as with school staff.

Summer Resident Camp includes many therapeutic camping activities. Canoeing, archery, swimming, arts and crafts and other activities allow deserving boys and girls the opportunity to build basic teamwork and peer communication skills. The youth also spend a week enjoying the beautiful, tranquil outdoor environment.

Programs & Services

Residential Leadership Programs are hosted at camp and led in conjunction with community partners. This sometimes includes JROTC, ROTC and other leadership groups that work with us to guide young people through challenging activities to help them grow their leadership skills.

Summer Day Camp consists of a variety of camping activities. These day camps are held on campus at the Youth Ranches around the state. Each one has special components, and whether it features a challenge course, horseback riding and horsemanship skills or a focus on aquatics, each Youth Ranch is a valuable resource to the community.



A Note Regarding COVID-19's Effect

As you review the total number of youth served in our residential and camping programs in 2020-2021, please keep in mind the incredible impact COVID-19 had on the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches.

In order to run summer camp in a safe and healthy way, we reduced our numbers and offered fewer sessions, yet were able to provide hundreds of needy children the opportunity to enjoy a fun and educational camp experience.

COVID-19 also had an impact on our residential campuses. New placements to our program were restricted because of the spike in cases in Florida, and many activities were canceled to keep our children and staff safe.

We ask that you remember these important factors when reviewing our program numbers from the 2020-2021 fiscal year.




